

Legal Inquiry

into the Invasion and Military Occupation of Iraq

Date: Saturday 8th November 2003 10am – 6pm **Venue:** Old Theatre, London School of Economics, Houghton Street

The legality of the war against Iraq has been a vital issue in recent times. Attracting less attention has been the related legality of the *conduct of the war* and subsequent *occupation* by the Coalition forces. But such matters may now be the active concern of the newly formed **International Criminal Court.** With the UK having ratified the ICC Statute, the Coalition's actions may be investigated and responsible persons prosecuted in the ICC.

PEACERIGHTS is organising a Legal Inquiry to examine one central question:

Is there sufficient cause for the International Criminal Court prosecutor to investigate members of the UK government for breaches of the ICC Statute in relation to crimes against humanity and/or war crimes committed during the Iraq conflict and occupation in 2003?

An internationally renowned panel of experts will consider the legal implications of:

Civilian casualties Choice of military targets Use of cluster bombs Conduct of Occupation

Experts and eye-witnesses will present evidence to the panel on each issue.
